3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

A JACEP - Extension Service enables the students to become more benevolent and active. Their exposure to the villages adopted is of great importance. They plunge willingly into their duty to serve the people. They create awareness among those who dwell in the villages, through their live enactment. Their selfless service has reached all the corners of the villages, which in turn had led the people to understand the importance of education, life and its value. They extend their community service in the adopted villages - Sakkaraipatty, Savadipatti, Jetloor, Jallipatti, Jeyamangalam and Jeyamangalam Colony, Meenachipuram, Pomminayakkampatti through the teams Environment, Education, Health and Hygiene, Liaison, People Organization and Application of Knowledge. Short films on cleanliness were screened to the public and various games were conducted for the village children. Awareness Programmes on Old age pension, Widow Pension, Educational loans, Scholarships were given. The importance of Education through Cultural Events like skit and street Play were depicted. Trainings were given to the

- organic Farming Techniques which was technically supported by the special lecture of Dr. C. Mabel Joshaline, Assistant Professor, Department of Rural Development Science, Arul Anandar College, Karumathur, Madurai Dt. under the sponsorship of Tamil Nadu State Council for Science and Technology.
- ☼ On 15th July, 2017, the students of Education Group visited their respective adopted villages namely Sakkaraipatty, Savadipatti, Jetloor, Jallipatti, Jeyamangalam and Jeyamangalam Colony, Meenachipuram, Pomminayakkampatti. Students gave awareness on the importance of Education through cultural events like skit and street Play. They helped the village students in their studies. Senior citizens and illiterate people were trained to put their signature on their own.
- The students of Liaison Group went to their respective adopted villages namely Sakkaraipatty, Savadipatti, Jetloor, Jallipatti, Jeyamangalam and Jeyamangalam colony, Meenachipuram, Pomminayakkampatti. They explained the Government schemes like Old age pension, Widow Pension, Educational loans, Scholarships etc, to the villagers. Students conducted games and distributed prizes to the winners on 29th July, 2017.
- The students of Environment Group went to Jallipatti, Jeyamangalam and Meenachipuram to celebrate Independence Day on 15th August, 2017. Short films on cleanliness were screened to the public and various games were conducted for the village children. After the celebration prizes were distributed to the winners and 47 saplings were distributed to the villagers for plantation.
- Students' of **Application of Knowledge** trained the villagers to prepare Paper Bags and the Bags were distributed to the shopkeepers in the respective villages. A Special Awareness was created among the villagers to keep their surrounding clean.
- The students of JACEP gathered in groups on 1st September, 2017 to
 assess the observations made by them during their visits to the adopted

- villages. Thematic street plays were video graphed for the villagers to create awareness.
- The JACEP members of 2017-2018 batches celebrated their Annual Day at the adopted villages and organized various competitions. A special awareness programme on Dengue were organized from 21st to 27th October, 2017.
- Art from **Electronic Waste** competition was conducted on 17th October, 2017.
- Students prepare paper bags and sell it to the canteen and stationery to make the campus 'Plastic Free Zone'.
- A special NSS Camp was organized at Vadugapatty from 12th to 18th November, 2017 on the theme **Involvement of Youth towards Super Power India.**
- A **Special Medical Camp** on Dengue Fever was organized on 7th August, 2017 and Nilavembu Kudineer was distributed to all.
- ☼ Dr. M. Devendran, Sakthi Diabetes Foundation, Batlagundu delivered a talk on How to Guard Ourselves against Diabetes on 9th August, 2017.
- A series of workshops were organized, which was supported and catalysed

- by Tamil Nadu State Council for Science and Technology, Chennai.
- A Cleanliness Campaign and a Rally were organized at Vadugapatty on 23rd September, 2017.

7.3 Give two Best Practices of the institution

Best Practice - I

Title of the Practice: JAC Extension Programme (JACEP)

◆ JACEP - Extension Service enables the students to become more benevolent and active. Their exposure to the villages adopted is of great importance. They plunge willingly into their duty to serve the people. They create awareness among those who dwell in the villages, through their live enactment. Their selfless service has reached all the corners of the villages, which in turn had led the people to understand the importance of education, life and its value. They extend their community service in the adopted villages - Sakkaraipatty, Savadipatti, Jetloor, Jallipatti, Jeyamangalam and Jeyamangalam Colony, Meenachipuram, Pomminayakkampatti through the teams Environment, Education, Health and Hygiene, Liaison, People Organization and Application of Knowledge.

2. Objectives of the practice

- ♦ The lofty objectives of JACEP are
- ♦ To liberate the weaker sections of the rural areas from the shackles of the perennial, economic, social, political and educational constraints.
- ◆ To provide social dimension to the educational system of the college and inculcate social responsibility and commitment in students.
- To bring forth the team spirit and leadership qualities of the students and broaden their social outlook that will help them work for the welfare of the community.
- ♦ To restore gender equity, provide equal opportunities and take up new ventures.

The Context

- ◆ Periyakulam is surrounded by villages populated mostly by untrained and unskilled daily wage earners who have been denied education due to economic constraints. Illiteracy has made them susceptible to exploitation, malnutrition, ill health, ignorance, superstitious beliefs and unhealthy customs and practices. It is the dire need of the villages to enlighten the innocent victims to be aware of their rights and provide necessary resources to uplift them from the mire of inequality and make their life worthwhile.
- The students and the staff reach the villagers through JACEP that devises plans to promote their welfare and live a dignified life like the privileged class of the society.

The Practice

- ◆ JACEP is an Extension programme offered to all UG students in IV and V Semesters under Part V of the curriculum. The students launch on the development of the villages through 70 contact hours. The students are trained to undertake the beneficial social service in three phases.
- Conducting a meticulous survey of the villages to record the particulars of the residents and the available resources.
- Analysing the collected details to draft viable plans.
- Executing the action plans and evaluating them to assess the outcome to ensure the fulfilment of the target.
- Since JACEP aims at overall development of the adopted villages, the students are divided into six groups to carry out the assigned tasks in 70 hours. Each of the six groups is entrusted with one of the six tasks Environment, Health and

- Hygiene, Education, People's organization, Application of Knowledge and Liaison with Government Agencies.
- ♦ JACEP adopts the common techniques to perform their tasks- organizes awareness camps and meetings, conducts competitions and screens documentaries to realize their goals.
- ◆ The **first group** (Education) propagates literacy programmes, advises against discontinuation of education, provides non-formal education, to adults and school dropouts and encourages people to watch educational programmes.
- ◆ The **second group** (Environment) advocates sanitation, cleanliness, frugal use of natural resources, conservation and protection of environment.
- ◆ The **third group** (Liasion with Government Agencies) binds the villagers with Government Agencies like District Rural Development Agency, Social Welfare Board, Block Development Office, Panchayat Union Office and Transport Corporation to fulfil their needs. It informs them of the Government Welfare schemes to reap the maximum benefits from them.
- ◆ The **fourth group** (Application of Knowledge) enables the students to apply their knowledge acquired in their respective subjects for the use of the people in the adopted villages.
- ◆ The **fifth group** (Health and Hygiene) undertakes a survey of health problems scrutinizes the reasons for illness and suggests remedy for healthy life.
- ◆ The **sixth group** (People's Organizations) enlightens the youth of the value of unity and team spirit and helps them form Youth Club, Women's Club and 'Sangams'. They bring agricultural labourers and masons and supportive workers into their fold and educate them on the need for skills to make them competent in their profession.
- ◆ Each group prepares and submits the action plan and executes it produced tangible results in accordance with the nature and convenience of its resources.

The highlights of the activities carried out by six groups:

♦ On 15th July, 2017, the students of Education Group visited their respective adopted villages namely Sakkaraipatty, Savadipatti, Jetloor, Jallipatti, Jeyamangalam and Jeyamangalam Colony, Meenachipuram,

Pomminayakkampatti. Students gave awareness on the importance of Education through cultural events like Skit and Street Play. They helped the village students in their studies. Senior citizens and illiterate people were trained to put their signature on their own.

- ♦ The students of Liaison Group went to their respective adopted villages namely Sakkaraipatty, Savadipatti, Jetloor, Jallipatti, Jeyamangalam and Jeyamangalam colony, Meenachipuram, Pomminayakkampatti. They explained the Government schemes like Old Age Pension, Widow Pension, Educational loans, Scholarships etc, to the villagers. Students conducted games and distributed prizes to the winners on 29th July, 2017.
- ♦ The students of Environment Group went to Jallipatti, Jeyamangalam and Meenachipuram to celebrate Independence Day on 15th August, 2017. Short films on cleanliness were screened to the public and various games were conducted for the village children. After the celebration prizes were distributed to the winners and 47 saplings were distributed to the villagers for plantation.
- ◆ On 21st August, 2017, student volunteers of JACEP went to Meenachipuram for the preliminary arrangement of **SWACHHTA BHARAT** visit.
- ◆ Students' of **Application of Knowledge** trained the villagers to prepare Paper Bags and the Bags were distributed to the shopkeepers in the respective villages. A special awareness was created among the villagers to keep their surrounding clean.
- ♦ The students of JACEP gathered in groups on 1st September, 2017 to assess the observations made by them during their visits to the adopted villages. Thematic street plays were video graphed for the villagers to create awareness.
- ♦ 38 Farmers from Vadugapatty, Thamaraikulam and Meenachipuram were trained on **Organic Farming Techniques** on 16th September, 2017.
- ♦ The JACEP members of 2017-2018 batches celebrated their Annual Day at the adopted villages and organized various competitions. A special awareness programmes on Dengue were organized from 21st to 27th October, 2017.
- ◆ Art from **Electronic Waste** competition was conducted on 17th October, 2017.

- ♦ The action plan for the year was consolidated on 30th November, 2018 and started executing the year plan of creating 'Plastic Free Zone' in and around the College and finalized to prepare and sell Paper Bags to the Canteen and Stationery.
- ♦ Students were trained to prepare bags with newspapers on 20th & 27th January, 2018.

Evidence of Success

The services in the form of awareness programmes, vocational training programmes, demonstration and education training programmes have instilled confidence in the target groups who have evinced great interest in improving their standard of life.

Outcome (Target Groups)

- ♦ The school children have displayed tremendous improvement in their studies.
- ♦ The youth have been preparing to appear for Competitive Examinations.
- ◆ The members of Self Help Groups have been generating income through making Phenoyl, Artificial Jewellery, Candle, Jam etc.,
- The people are able to utilise bank loan schemes.
- ♦ They have been trying to apply for loans to start Self Employment Units.
- Preventive measures were taken to safeguard people against health hazards.
- ♦ The rate of dropouts has come down.

Outcome (Students)

- o JACEP has provided them experiential learning.
- o The students have been excited in educating the villagers.
- o They have been aware of the challenges prevailing in the society.
- The link between the College and the adopted villages has strengthened the ties between the students and the people.
- o It has improved their organisational and managerial abilities of the students.
- o JACEP has developed the personality of the students.

Problems encountered and resources required

- The negative attitude of the people has posed a great challenge to the students.
- Gathering people for programmes was a tough task.
- ♦ Lack of proper bus facility to the villages is another impediment to the prompt execution of plans.
- ♦ Inadequacy of water and toilet facilities and lack of public buildings for conducting programmes are other problems encountered by the students.

- ♦ Measures taken to rectify the problems:
- ♦ Counselling was given to people for motivation
- ♦ Approached Panchayat Unions for physical facilities.
- ♦ Appeal is made to Minibus owners to provide bus facility.

Best Practice - II

Title of the Practice: Promotion of Research

Research is the major component of Higher Education. It widens the intellectual perspective of both the staff and the students. The mental calibre of an individual is adjudged by the contribution made by him/ her to research. The research achievement of both the teachers and the students is the most important factor that determines the rank of the institutions. Generation of new knowledge and the expansion of the existing knowledge pave way for the progress of the country in the world arena as the economic development of any country depends solely on research. JAC vies with other institutions in providing opportunities, creating and augmenting infrastructure facilities encouraging and supporting staff and students to launch on research projects.

2. Objectives of the Practice

- ◆ To keep pace with the relentless wheel of change and update the intellectual calibre of the faculty.
- ♦ To encourage the faculty to pursue Ph.D.
- ♦ To acquire guideship to produce more research scholars.
- To motivate the faculty to apply for the major and minor research projects by providing guidelines and details of funding agencies.
- ◆ To fulfil the requirements to promote the research departments into research centres.
- ♦ To collaborate with other institutions and universities in and abroad.
- ♦ To arrange for interface among the institutions, industries and the public to take up research projects relevant for the present day.
- ♦ To encourage the faculty and the students to organize and present research papers in the national/ international seminars/ conferences/ workshops.
- ♦ To publish quality research articles in reputed journals, edit study materials for the prescribed syllabus and author books of high originality.
- ♦ To provide seed money for research activities.
- ♦ To take steps for publishing a Research Journal.

3. The Context

Being aware of the need of research in Higher Educational Institutions, the college has multiplied the required infrastructure facilities for research in the College. The college is supported by DST - FIST from the academic year 2015-16 to enhance the research activities. DST-FIST & BSR Labs fetches revenue for its maintenance receiving samples from the universities in Tamil Nadu & Kerala. 653 samples were received from outside and analysed using XRD, UV, FTIR & AAS, during this academic year.

- Science Departments have been provided with laboratories filled with advanced High Tech equipments.
- The number of books required for research has been added to the library stock.
- ◆ The research section in the library displays the copes of dissertations, theses and project reports of the scholars.
- ◆ Easy access is made to net facility in the college browsing centres and departments.
- Staff and students are encouraged to organise/ attend and present papers in the research oriented conferences/ seminars within and out of the Colleges and publish research papers in peer reviewed journals with high impact factor.

Challenging issues to be addressed while designing and implementing the practice:

- ♦ Lack of interest to take up research.
- ♦ Hindrance from domestic problems faced by the students drunken fathers, financial constraints, lack of facilities at home etc.,
- ◆ Lack of time on the part of the teachers who are bent on improving the academic standard of the first generation learners.
- Reluctance to learn and use modern technological devices for research.

4. The Practice

The Research committee has created a research environment at the college through Research Forum. It has provided a platform for the Ph.D. Research Scholars to make the presentation of their findings in the Research forum. The views and comments offered by the Principal, the Guides of the Research Scholars, the other teachers and peers have instilled in them confidence to focus on their research. JAC JOSHAM, (Journal of the College) publishes research articles from the scholars within and out of the College.

♦ The institution motivates the faculty to do research for Ph.D. under FIP scheme from the UGC or individually through Part Time. The College encourages the teachers to undertake Major and Minor Research Projects funded by UGC or other agencies.

Support facilities for research

- ♦ Leave is sanctioned to the staff who are on the verge of completing their research work.
- Special Permission and Leave are given on request to visit to various universities and libraries for data collection.
- ♦ The management motivates the staff to go to the educational institutions in other countries for paper presentation by procuring travel grant from the UGC.
- ♦ Linkage is formed with Liverpool Hope University, U.K. to promote teaching, learning and research.
- ◆ The management extends financial assistance to the self-financed faculty who make research publications in the journals with high impact factor.
- ◆ Teachers are rewarded with medals for their publications in journals on the College Day.

Constraints faced in the pursuit of research

- ◆ The gap between academia and industries is not fully bridged to fulfil the needs of industries due to lack of time for the internship of the students in the industries.
- Getting funds from various funding agencies is a challenge to the staff and the students.
- ♦ The period of hands-on training in the industries is inadequate to address challenges faced in the job market.
- ◆ Field Research is planned to be under taken in Extension Programme to solve real life problems.
- ◆ The students and the teachers have to be encouraged to take up Interdisciplinary and socio-economic developmental research.
- Ph.D. holders can be motivated to publicize their research in the form of books.

Evidence of Success

- ♦ 34 Research Scholars are pursuing Ph.D. under 15 Guides.
- ♦ Six faculty have completed their Ph.D.

- ♦ Four staff have been approved as guides from Mother Teresa Women's University, Kodaikanal.
- ♦ 20 Ph.D. Scholars and 40 M.Phil Scholars presented the progress of their research work in the research forum on 19th December, 2017 and 25th June, 2018.
- Research Committee published two issues of the Research Journal "JAC JOSHAM", with 11 Articles in June and 31 Articles, in December, 2017.
- One completed Major Research Project Report was submitted to UGC.
- Three International, 13 National and 14 State Level Conferences/ Seminars / Workshops were organised by the Departments and IQAC.
- ♦ 78 staff have presented 91 papers in the International & National Conferences. 83 staff have participated in the International, National & State Level Conferences.
- 97 staff have published 141 papers in the National and International Journals.
- Eighteen staff members published 6 books.
- ♦ 56 students have published 45 papers in the Journals and 76 students have presented 56 papers in the Conferences.
- ♦ 32 staff acted as resource persons and enriched others with their expertise in their subjects.
- ◆ Department Study Circle renews the research experience and output of the staff members. 11 staff members from the Department of Tamil, 14 from English, 2 from History, 5 from Mathematics, 2 from Physics, 7 from Chemistry, 2 from Zoology, 2 from Computer Science, 5 from Commerce, 8 from B.B.A. and 6 from Commerce CA have spoken on the advanced topics in their subjects.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

- ♦ More grants from the UGC and other funding agencies will bring out rich research output in the form of publications of books and papers in reputed journals.
- ♦ More funds can be given by the UGC to increase the infrastructure facilities in terms of equipments, books, ICT facilities etc.,

- Grants can be given to teachers and students to participate and present research papers in State Level and National Level Conferences and seminars.
- Special grants can be provided by the UGC to open research centres in all the departments.
- ◆ International collaboration and co-operation can be sought to make research more qualitative.
