

The height of the mountain seem to touch the stars in the sky. One can only climb to the lower regions and explore only those regions. The higher regions remain unexplored. In the same way there is something profound and mysterious about Shakespeare's personality and genius and we cannot hope to understand it fully.

He drew his character from all walks of life, be it an innocent Antonio, Vivacious Rosalind, wise Portia, Romantic Romeo, Miserly shylock or lovable Lorenzo. Every character shoots its eminence in myriad shapes and guises. Nobody could fathom him or criticise him. His knowledge of the passions, humour and sentiments of mankind has been perfectly

expressed. Shakespeare's heroines are Intelligent, beautiful witty, affectionate sacrificing and highly resourceful and adventurous young girls. His heroes too are equally loving devoted, valiant and steadfast. Shakespeare delights in taking his lovers to an atmosphere of romance, enchantment pastoral woodland world of music and imaginative idealism.

Shakespeare grew steady in fame and wealth. The richness of Shakespeare's imagination reveals his genius, his felicity of expression and sweetness of language is highly praised. His heroes are men of high order - great Emperor, King and General. He is basically good, but a tragic flaw in his character brings him down. The tragic hero arouses pity and fear in us. Shakespeare adds supernatural powers such as the Ghosts, Witches, Apparitions omens and superstitions — They operate in a peculiar way where the hero stumbles. The witches in *Macbeth* and the ghost in *Hamlet* belong to the above mentioned world which is uncanny and mysterious. Further Shakespeare intensifies the tragic atmosphere with tempests, rains, hailstorms, earthquake and meteors. Madness overtakes Hamlet. He has been more than four centuries dead. But he lives unrivall'd still.

"Revolving years have flitted on
Corroding time has done its worst,
Pilgrim and worshipper have gone
From Avon's shrine to shrines of dust;
But Shakespeare lives unrivall'd still
And unapproached by mortal mind
The giant of Parnassus' hill
The Pride, the monarch of mankind"

Shakespeare stands firm and strong as a fort, a beacon light shedding rays of wisdom to generations. His fame has broadened his genius which has been universally felt. His muse soared to the stars. His heart is in every word he writes and his plays gives him tremendous power. It could be said that the wealth of his plays are by and large a literary mirror reflecting

Shakespeare was the only dramatist who had so much command over multitudes.

His Sonnets are remarkable. They have been described by Walter Raliegh as 'The Cave of Mystery'. However some series of sonnets record the moral chaos and spiritual suffering of the poet. His Romantic comedies are stories of romance beauty and love leading finally to happy marriage. In the path of love Shakespeare puts in hindrances, complications cross—wooings and transfer of affections. But towards the end all the knots are cut the path becomes smooth leading to wedlock. The happy union takes place with love joy and youthful gaiety.

Some of the features of the mature comedies of Shakespeare are an atmosphere of optimism very little of satirical elements, predominance of young lovers pastoral elements charmingly and enchantingly portrayed. Almost all the

comedies open with a delightful note. The mood of the opening scene is one of joy and hope. When the lovers confront serious problems they have excessive confidence and never give way to gloomy thoughts. In *Twelfth Night*, Duke Orsino expresses the sweet sadness thus

"If music be the food of love, play on,
Give me excess of it; that, surfeiting,
The appetite may sicken and so die
That strain again; - it had a dying fall;
O, it came o'er my ear like the sweet south,
That breathes upon a bank of violets,
Stealing and giving odour."

Shakespeare's maturity as a playwright shows its best in his characterisation of Fools in comedies. The Fools not only exhibit fun and mirth, they seem to have been endowed with experiences which are very deep and wide when expressed. They too have a keen insight into people around them. Feste in *Twelfth Night* is innocent but could see through Olivia's vanity in her mourning and the Duke's tilting moods. Touch stone who wears the conventional 'motley' of a jester is shrewd,

Shakespeare's tragic heroes are men of outstanding accomplishments. They are far beyond the scale of the common man and their experiences are so extreme that we cannot regard them as ordinary men. The tragic hero of Shakespeare suffers internally and externally, he struggles with a threatening chaos. Shakespeare's psychological insight has transformed *Hamlet* into a work of great genius.
